A Garden with a Difference

In July this year we stayed for a few days at Ross on Wye in Herefordshire and naturally visited a number of gardens in the area. One of them stood out from all the others, and not for the reason you might think – **Shipley Gardens** at Holme Lacy, HR2 6LS.

On the B4399 just outside Holme Lacy village, we saw a narrow dirt track and thought "this cannot be it". Oh yes it was, but we only discovered that after carrying on to the bridge over the Wye and then turning round and finding a decrepit sign almost completely hidden in the hedge opposite the lane. The track down to the house and garden is quite rough and drops steeply at one point but is passable if you take it slowly.

We were met by Bob, the owner, who told us that he had bought the 30 acres in the 1950s. Since then he had built house, stables, outhouses and developed the garden, which must have been wonderful in its heyday. Before we even got to see the garden he invited us into a large ground floor room which was a virtual museum. One item there was a very long fur coat and alongside it a portrait of Bob wearing it. He told us that it, but not

he, had been to the south pole. Eventually, after showing us lots of other 'treasures' he led us into the garden.

Our first stop was at what looked like a giant greenhouse but what a surprise when we entered; it housed a large swimming pool – not that you would dare venture into it, the water was dark green with algae – but around the pool were numerous pots in which Bob was growing all sorts of exotic vegetables and flowering plants. He was a very knowledgeable plantsman indeed.

We were then left to explore. As you can see from the photograph, the grounds around it were hardly what you would describe as neat and tidy and many parts were frankly overgrown. There was a mixture of woods, secret gardens, pergolas, amazing plants, various decrepit items and lots of informative notices. Walking around you had to avoid the nettles and brambles. Maintaining such a large site is now obviously beyond him, so he has made a virtue out of a necessity; it is a wildlife haven. If you like your gardens all regimented with rows of flowers, this is not the place for you, but for those who appreciate the importance of wild places, we would thoroughly recommend it. Admission is just £3 per person. If you wanted to be spoiled and see some formal gardens you could always stay at the nearby Holme Lacy House Warner Hotel.

Feedback suggests the show was well received, 50 entrants with over 300 entries suggests that the show maintained continuity despite a missing year, it was well publicised, most classes had a strong showing, though the art class usually has a stronger take-up, eggs were new this year – we hope they will gather a little momentum. There were no entries to childrens' classes apart from photography. There were however several younger competitors in the adult classes.

St James' still proves to be a good venue, the staff are helpful and we feel the rooms allocated for refreshments were at least as good as before.

Gordon's gathering of sponsorships and auction of produce reflects well in the cost analysis. The total cost was £280, which we believe compares well with previous shows.

Support across the board was flawless at all stages, many thanks to all who supported the show and gave their time and effort.

Further feedback related to the date of the show, with suggestions that an earlier date would bring a better entry from some classes, it may be swings and roundabouts but your show committee is willing to suggest bringing the show forward by two weeks. One outcome would be a "clash" with the food fair, this could well be a positive. Accrington Bonsai are otherwise engaged and although we mentioned a date change in our thanks to judges we have not yet had any response to this.

Your Show Organising Committee will be happy to run the show again in 2018. Another fine sunny day would be nice

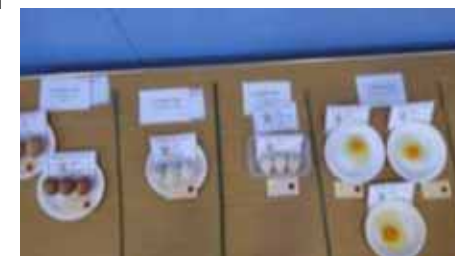
